RESOLVED to deny request and allow zero chickens citing property area and neighbor objections





To Whom It May Concern,

My name is Daniel Murza and I live in Troy at 2218 Tucker Dr. with my wife and four sons.

I am writing this letter requesting a domestic animal variance for our 10 chickens. Our property is a little less than 0.6 acres, and the requirement is for a minimum of 0.75 acres.

My three younger boys are homeschooled and raising chickens on our property has helped with hands on activities in the Science and Independent Living Skills curricula. As a Special Education teacher in Troy, I know how important practical applications are in the learning process. Our boys have grown emotionally attached to the chickens and the prospect of a potential separation has made them very sad and concerned.

Moreover, please consider the following reasons for our application.

- a) It is a great hobby. Poultry are fun pets and are inexpensive to raise. Socially, the presence of poultry could be a catalyst for conversations as they stir interest. Children in the community are very enthusiastic about playing with our chickens. Recent conversations with surrounding neighbors attest to that fact.
- b) Chickens contribute to Improved lawn. Chickens are ground birds, with strong, sturdy feet that are meant for digging and scratching in search of grubs, worms, bugs, tender shoots, and aerating. They turn leaf litter and dead bio-matter into the soil. Chickens provide weed control. As they scratch and claw the ground, they eat and disperse weed seeds that have blown in

- c) Fresh eggs from chickens raised in a loving, natural environment Organic & Non-GMO eggs provide
- d) For a balanced ecosystem.
- Chickens are omnivores by nature and thoroughly enjoy chasing down plantdestroying insects like grasshoppers, grubs, beetles, and larvae. Also, up to 25% of a chicken's diet can be table scraps, thereby avoiding landfill waste. Every bird can bio-recycle more than 2 pounds per month in vegetable matter and table waste.
- A flock of 10 birds, if fed a diet of 75 percent layer ration and 25 percent food waste, can eat more than 250 pounds per year in waste.
- e) Benefits for the chickens.
- Cruelty Free
- 300 million birds each year are crammed into cages that are far too small
- Hens on factory farms are often kept in such close, inhumane quarters that they cannot stretch their legs or wings, walk around, or participate in normal social behaviors
- Give a bird a chance at a happy life

Our chickens are kept in adequate conditions and raised very humanely. We buy exclusively organic feed and have built a large chicken coop to ensure comfort.

We have taken steps and purchased a large chicken enclosure to ensure that neighbors would not be negatively impacted by our chickens.

We know of some families in Troy who obtained this variance although their property is significantly smaller than ours.

Please consider granting us this waiver.


