3. Revision of Parking Restrictions on Stoney Cove Court

Steve Greene of 1930 Stoney Cove Court requests that the cul-de-sac of Stoney Cove Court be marked NO PARKING since parking on the cul-de-sac may create a potential obstruction for emergency vehicles.

Stoney Cove Court is a very short street and existing signs at the cul-de-sac are in accordance with City policy of restricting parking in 2/3^{rds} of the cul-de-sac.

Lt. Matlick of the Fire Department reviewed the parking restrictions and recommends that one of the NO PARKING signs be moved to completely prohibit parking on the cul-de-sac, for proper fire truck access.

SUGGESTED RESOLUTION:

- a. Recommend completely prohibiting parking on the cul-de-sac.
- b. Recommend no changes.

4. Revise Fire Lanes for Hill Elementary School

At the November meeting of the Traffic Committee, Ms. Cindy Nurak reported a traffic safety concern during school arrival and dismissal times in the section of Quincy between Mill Pond and Hill Elementary School. This section of Quincy is around 130 feet, and during arrival and dismissal a number of parents park in this area and take their kids to the school building. Observations indicate that during the 15 minutes before school starts, there is a solid line of cars extending from the STOP sign at the school to the intersection of Mill Pond, often in violation of the minimum distance requirement (15 feet) from STOP signs and intersections.

The committee recommended installation of signs indicating NO PARKING BETWEEN 8:00-9:00 a.m. and 3:00-4:00 p.m., SCHOOL DAYS ONLY on both sides of Quincy for 100 feet east of Mill Pond and on Mill Pond 100 feet north of Quincy.

As a part of the discussions, residents and school staff indicated that parents also park at inappropriate locations within the school parking lots and service road. Lt. Matlick was requested to study the existing fire lanes and revise them for maximum safety. Attached, please find the proposed fire lanes. This will prevent parking on the service road and parking aisles.

SUGGESTED RESOLUTION:

- a. Recommend that the fire lanes/tow away zones shown on the attached sketch be established at Hill Elementary School.
- b. Recommend no changes.

5. Report by the Traffic Engineer on 2002 Traffic Crashes

Following are traffic crash numbers for the intersections and roadway segments of major roads in the City (top 20 high number of crashes). The corresponding number of crashes for 2001 and 2000 are also provided. An intersection is defined by the area within a 200-foot radius circle from the center of the intersection. Roadway segment refers to that portion of the roadway that falls between the intersections. It should be noted that these numbers reflect the frequency of traffic crashes only, and does not take into consideration the traffic volumes (exposure factor).
