If you feel that the matter has not been resolved

satisfactorily, you are encouraged to bring it to the attention of the City Manager, and if still not resolved satisfactorily, to the Mayor and Council.

- Petitioners of items that are included in the pre-printed agenda booklet shall be given a fifteen (15) minute presentation time that may be extended with the majority consent of City Council.
- Any member of the public, not a petitioner of an item, shall be allowed to speak for up to three (3) minutes to address any Public Hearing item.
- Any member of the public, not a petitioner of an item, does not have the right to engage in discussion or debate with City Council during the Public Comment portions of the meeting.
- All members of the public who wish to address the Council at a meeting shall be allowed to speak only if they have signed up to speak within thirty minutes before or within fifteen minutes after the meeting's start time. Signing up to speak requires each speaker provide his or her name. If the speaker is addressing an item(s) that appears on the pre-printed agenda, then the speaker shall also identify each such agenda item number(s) to be addressed.
- City Council may waive the requirements of this section by a consensus of the City Council.
- Agenda items that are related to topics where there is significant public input anticipated should initiate the scheduling of a special meeting for that specific purpose.

Prior to Public Comment for Items On the Agenda, the Mayor may provide a verbal notification of the rules of decorum for City Council meetings or refer to the pre-printed agenda booklet, which will include the following language, as approved by City Council:

The audience should be aware that all comments are to be directed to the Council rather than to City Administration or the audience. Anyone who wishes to address the Council is required to sign up to speak within thirty minutes before or within fifteen minutes of the start of the meeting. There are three Public Comment portions of the agenda. For Items On the Agenda, visitors can sign up to address Postponed, Regular Business, Consent Agenda, or Study items or any other item on the agenda. All other topics are addressed under Items Not on the Agenda. There is a timer on the City Council table in front of the Mayor that turns yellow when there is one minute of speaker time remaining, and turns red when the speaker's time is up. In order to make the meeting more orderly and out of respect, please do not clap during the meeting, and please do not use expletives or make derogatory or disparaging comments about any one person or group. If you do so, then there may be immediate consequences, including having the microphone turned off, being asked to leave the meeting, and/or the deletion of speaker comments for any re-broadcast of the meeting. Speakers should also be careful to avoid saying anything that would subject them to civil liability, such as slander and defamation. Please avoid these consequences and voluntarily assist us in maintaining the decorum befitting this great City.

WHEREAS, The City of Troy greatly values the contributions of the volunteer members of the Troy Fire Department towards the safety and wellbeing of our community; and,

WHEREAS, In recognition of these benefits, and to encourage participation and retention in the Troy Fire Department's volunteer service, the City of Troy City Council provided incentive benefits since approximately 1980, and this was more formally accomplished in the City of Troy Incentive Trust for Volunteer Firefighters (Trust), and also the City of Troy Incentive Plan for Volunteer Firefighters (Plan), which was approved by the Troy City Council on April 4, 2016. Pursuant to the terms of the Trust, funding was limited to payment of volunteer firefighter incentives and the costs of administration; and,

WHEREAS, As of the start of the fiscal year following the approval of the Plan (July 1, 2017), the annual incentive benefit per year of credited service was \$769, and although the volunteer firefighters have annually requested modifications since that time, there were extenuating circumstances that delayed proposed amendments to the Plan; and,

WHEREAS, The Plan authorizes the Troy City Council to unilaterally amend the Plan in order to facilitate increases to the annual incentive benefit per year of credited service, as well as approve other amendments, including but not limited to an additional incentive in recognition of the additional time and energy spent by the volunteers who serve as station officers; and,

WHEREAS, City Administration has reviewed the fiscal implications of the proposed amendments to the Plan, and has attempted to balance the best interest of the City and the best interest of the volunteer firefighters, and recommends approval of the attached amendments, as indicated in a red line format in the attached document;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That Troy City Council hereby **APPROVES** the attached amendments to the Plan, and **AUTHORIZES** the Mayor and City Clerk to execute the Amended City of Troy Incentive Plan for Volunteer Firefighters on behalf of the City; a copy of the amended Plan shall be **ATTACHED** to the original Minutes of this meeting.

Subject: Changes to Volunteer Firefighters Incentive Program

History

Prior to 2016, the Troy City Council passed resolutions, setting an annual amount that would be multiplied by years of service as a deferred incentive plan for City of Troy volunteer firefighters. In 2016, based on requests from the volunteer firefighters, City Council approved a Trust and an Incentive Plan which, upon information and belief, is unique and similar plans and amounts are not used in any other volunteer or paid-on-call fire department. However, the City of Troy wanted to demonstrate its appreciation for the dedication and commitment of our volunteer firefighters, and provided very generous benefits.

The trust and plan are based on Section 115 of the Internal Revenue Code, and patterned after the City's Retiree Health Care Trust. With a trust, the amounts set aside in the trust can only be used to pay the length of service benefits, in accordance with the incentive plan, which provided greater protection. Additionally, investment income could be realized through a trust.

Due to the unique nature of Troy's proposed volunteer firefighter trust and incentive plan, the City sought guidance from the Internal Revenue Service before approving the documents. This plan provides significantly greater benefits than the IRS provision that expressly allows for up to \$6,000 in deferred compensation for volunteer firefighters under Section 457 (e)(110), which is adjusted by the CPI increases. In order to comply with the IRS regulations, there must be a "risk of forfeiture." This is why the trust was drafted to provide ONLY the Troy City Council with the option of amending or terminating the Trust and/or the Plan (Section 1:107). As authorized under the Code, the Troy City Council has the ability, but not the responsibility, to increase or decrease the annual amounts for the length of service plan.

When the Trust and Plan were adopted in 2016, the Troy City Council increased the annual amounts through a resolution that provided increases through July 1, 2018. Although the volunteer firefighters requested an increase effective as of July 1, 2019, this was unavoidably temporarily put on hold. To avoid this situation in the future, the proposed Amended Plan automatically incorporates an annual CPI increase for the plan, and City Council asked that this be retroactive to July 1, 2019.



City Administration has met with representatives from each of the fire stations, worked to understand their interests, and obtained their recommendation for financial increases to the benefit, which included more than a CPI increase. Upon information and belief, the volunteer firefighters have also met with individual City Council members, requesting greater annual increases than the CPI increase. Upon information and belief, the volunteer firefighters are relying on financial projections that they proposed in 2016. These proposed increases were not vetted by City Administration or City Council, however.

Of course, City Council retains the authority to amend the Incentive Plan for Volunteer Firefighters, and could increase the annual amounts above CPI increases. City Administration has not requested our actuaries perform any additional work, since there is a cost for this additional work, and City Administration feels very strongly that the Incentive Plan should be approved as proposed. It should also be noted that the proposed Amended Plan includes an additional incentive for those members serving as station officers; provides credit for partial months served; adds an option for surviving spouses to receive incentive benefits; and clarifies some of the language.

Financial

City Administration is concerned that a commitment to increases greater than the CPI, as requested by the volunteer firefighters, could result in a significant financial hardship, especially since the City's income is essentially tied to the CPI. City Administration is charged with presenting a proposed budget for Troy City Council consideration. The CPI increases that are incorporated into the Amended Plan are already expected to cost approximately \$415,000, thereby increasing the Fire Department's operating budget by 7.5%, and will reduce the funded ratio of the Plan from 54.5 % funded to 48.3%. Any increase over and above this amount will also shift the funded ratio, and must also be balanced against other City needs, such as additional employees to provide desired City services or desired capital expenditures. Additionally, City Administration is concerned about providing bargaining powers to the volunteer firefighters, and/or removing the status as a "volunteer" as a result of the amounts paid through this plan and also provided to each station.

Recommendation

Approval of the Amended Plan, as proposed by City Administration for City Council action, expresses appreciation for the dedication and commitment of our firefighters and addresses their concerns, while being fiscally responsible.

City Administration recommends approval of the attached Amended City of Troy Incentive Plan For Volunteer Firefighters.

AMENDED CITY OF TROY INCENTIVE PLAN FOR VOLUNTEER FIREFIGHTERS

Chapter 1. GENERAL PROVISIONS

1:100. Establishment and Purpose.

This City of Troy Incentive Plan for Volunteer Firefighters is hereby restated, as amended, for the purpose of providing length of service incentive benefits for the City of Troy volunteer firefighters.

1:101. Short Title.

This Plan may be known and cited as the City of Troy Incentive Plan for Volunteer Firefighters ("Plan").

1:102. Definitions.

For the purposes of this Plan, the following words shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them by this section:

- (1) Annual Benefit Amount means the annual dollar amount of the length of service incentive benefits which may be payable from the Plan to eligible Former Participants, as amended from time to time by City Council via a budget appropriations resolution.
- (2) Break in service shall mean an unapproved leave of absence or termination of service as a volunteer firefighter lasting more than one (1) year.
- (3) *City* means the City of Troy, Michigan.
- (4) *City Council* means the City Council of the City of Troy, Michigan.
- (5) Code means the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended. Reference to any section or subsection of the Code includes reference to any comparable or succeeding provision of any legislation which amends or replaces such section or subsection and any regulations thereto.
- (6) *Contribution(s)* means the payments made to the Trust by the City for the purpose of providing length of service based incentive benefits to Former Participants and beneficiaries covered by the Plan.
- (7) Deferred Former Participant means a former volunteer firefighter and Former Participant who has ten (10) or more years of incentive service as a volunteer firefighter for the City, but has not reached the requisite age requirement for commencement of benefits from the Plan.
- (8) Eligible Former Participant means an individual who is (a) an active volunteer firefighter, who upon attaining eligibility, elected to commence receipt of incentive

benefits and is therefore no longer entitled to further benefit accruals under the provisions of this Plan; (b) a former volunteer firefighter, who upon termination of volunteer service was eligible for, and elected to commence receipt, of incentive benefits from the Plan; (c) a former volunteer firefighter, who is eligible for incentive benefits from the Plan but has not yet elected to commence receipt of incentive benefits from the Plan; or (d) a Deferred Former Participant.

- (9) *Incentive Service Credit* means personal service rendered to the City as a volunteer firefighter and credited to a Participant in accordance with the Plan.
- (10) *Ineligible Former Participant* shall mean an individual who ceases to be an active volunteer firefighter prior to attainment of eligibility for incentive benefits under the provisions of this Plan.
- (11) *Participant* means an individual who is an active volunteer firefighter eligible for benefit accruals under the provisions of the Plan and who has not elected to commence receipt of benefits under the terms of the Plan.
- (12) *Plan* means the City of Troy Incentive Plan for Volunteer Firefighters established by Ordinance as provided herein. A description of the incentive benefits provided to Eligible Former Participants, spouses and dependents under the Plan is maintained by the Plan Administrator.
- (13) *Plan Administrator* means the person, persons, firm, corporation or insurance company or companies, appointed by the City to administer the Plan. The Plan Administrator shall be responsible for the day-to-day operations of the Plan and shall carry out the directives of the City and the Board of Trustees.
- (14) Service shall mean personal service rendered to the City of Troy as a volunteer firefighter.
- (15) Spouse means a Participant's or Eligible Former Participant's spouse by legal marriage who is the Participant's or Eligible Former Participant's spouse on the earlier of the date the Participant terminates from volunteering with the City or elects to commence receipt of incentive benefits from the Plan.
- (16) Station Officer means a *Participant* who serves as Station Assistant Chief; Station Captain; or Station Lieutenant.
- (17) *Trust* means the City of Troy Incentive Trust for Volunteer Firefighters as established pursuant to the declaration of trust approved by the City Council and as may be amended from time to time.
- (18) *Trustee(s)* or *Board* means the Board of Trustees of the Trust or a member of the Board of Trustees of the Trust as provided for in the Trust.
- (19) *Voluntary Incentive Committee* means a committee comprised of representatives selected by each of the six fire stations in the City.

1:103. Interpretation and law; Construction.

- (1) The Plan is hereby established and shall be administered consistent with applicable Federal and Michigan law, including, but not limited to the Public Employee Retirement System Investment Act, Public Act 314 of 1965, as amended (MCL §38.1132 et seq.).
- (2) The establishment of this Plan, any modification thereof, the creation of any fund or account, or the payment of any benefits, shall not be construed as giving to any person covered under the Plan, or any other person, any legal or equitable right against the City, its elected or appointed officials or employees, the Trustees or any individual Trustee, except as may otherwise be provided in this Plan document.
- (3) The headings and subheadings in this Plan are inserted for convenience of reference only and are not to be considered in the construction of any provision of the Plan.
- (4) Words herein in the masculine gender shall be construed to include the feminine gender where appropriate, and words used herein in the singular or plural shall be construed as being in the plural or singular where appropriate.
- (5) In resolving any conflict among provisions of this Plan or any uncertainty as to the meaning or intention of any provision of this Plan, the interpretation that causes both the Trust to be exempt from tax and the Trust to comply with all applicable requirements of the Code shall prevail over any different interpretation.
- (6) This Plan shall be binding upon all Participants and Eligible Former Participants under the Plan, or their applicable heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and assigns.

1:104. Administrative Regulations.

The provisions of this Plan are subject to relevant provisions of any administrative regulations that the City may have for volunteer firefighters and any volunteer service contracts between the City and an individual Participant, if any. The provisions of any administrative regulations or service contracts for volunteer firefighters relative to incentive benefits are controlling in the event of a conflict between the terms of the administrative regulations or applicable service contract and the Plan.

1:105. Notice.

Notice given to all interested parties shall, unless otherwise specified in this Plan, be sufficient if in writing and delivered or sent by prepaid first class mail. Except as otherwise noted, the distribution or delivery of any statements or documents required under the Plan shall be sufficient if delivered in person or prepaid first class mail.

1:106. Reporting and Disclosure.

The Plan Administrator shall complete and provide to Participants, Eligible Former Participants, Spouses and Dependents, and to the appropriate government agencies any reports as may be required by the Code, applicable federal, state or local law.

1:107. Amendment and Termination.

- (1) The provisions of the Plan may be amended at any time by the City Council in accordance with applicable law. The Voluntary Incentive Committee will be notified at least thirty (30) days in advance that a proposed amendment or revision will be submitted to the City Council for consideration. The City Council shall hold a public hearing prior to any action to reduce Plan benefits or terminate the Plan.
- (2) The City reserves the right to modify or terminate the Plan and/or the benefits payable under the Plan at any time in its sole discretion after the requisite public hearing. Such a termination shall not affect the amount of any incentive payments made prior to the effective date of termination of the Plan or incentive payments otherwise payable at the time of such termination for which assets remain in the Trust. The Voluntary Incentive Committee will be notified at least ninety (90) days in advance that a proposed Plan termination will be submitted to the City Council for consideration.

Chapter 2. INCENTIVE PLAN FOR VOLUNTEER FIREFIGHTERS

1:200. Participation.

- (1) Except as otherwise provided herein, each active volunteer firefighter of the City shall be a Participant in the Plan.
- (2) Participation shall terminate upon the earlier of termination of duties as a volunteer firefighter or commencement of incentive benefits under the provisions of this Plan.

1:201. Service Credit.

- (1) A Participant shall be credited with one month of incentive service credit for each calendar month the Participant is an active volunteer firefighter and meets or exceeds the attendance requirements as identified in the Troy Fire Department Policy Directive 103.07 provided that ten (10) or more days of service are rendered by the Participant for that calendar month. Service shall be totaled in years and months.
- (2) For each full month of station officer service starting July 1, 2020, active volunteer firefighters who serve as a station officer shall be credited with 1.3 months of service. This 1.3 multiplier shall only be used as a means to calculate the incentive benefits once the participant is eligible to receive incentive benefits in accordance with Section 1:202(2).
- (3) Should any Participant cease to be an active volunteer firefighter prior to attaining ten (10) or more years of continuous service as a volunteer firefighter, he or she shall immediately cease to be a Participant in this Plan and all incentive service credit shall be forfeited, unless otherwise provided herein.
- (4) Incentive service credit shall be restored to an Ineligible Former Participant upon returning to active duty as a volunteer firefighter within five (5) years from the date he or she ceased to be an active volunteer firefighter, and so long as he/she remains an active volunteer firefighter and a Participant in the Plan for five (5) consecutive years after returning to active service. In the event an Ineligible Former Participant returns to service as an active volunteer firefighter after a break in service lasting five (5) or more

years, incentive service credit shall be restored upon remaining an active volunteer firefighter and a Participant in the Plan for ten (10) consecutive years after returning to service.

(5) In the event a Deferred Former Participant returns to service as an active volunteer firefighter, prior incentive service credit shall not be combined with new incentive service credit until after returning for five (5) consecutive years of active service as a volunteer firefighter. Payments will be in accordance with Section 1:202.

1:202. Benefits.

- (1) An eligible Participant or Eligible Former Participant, upon written application filed with the Board of Trustees and the receipt of approval, shall be paid incentive benefits pursuant to the provisions of this Plan. The incentive benefits due an eligible Participant or Eligible Former Participant shall be determined at the time he or she terminates participation, as provided in the Plan. Credited service under Section 1.201 shall be combined for benefit eligibility purposes only after a Participant's return to active service as a volunteer firefighter for five (5) consecutive years.
- (2) Except as otherwise set forth in the Plan, a Participant shall be eligible for incentive benefit payments upon his termination of Participation in the Plan and satisfaction of the following eligibility criteria as may be amended from time to time by resolution of City Council:
 - (a) Ten (10) years of incentive service credit with at least five consecutive years as a participant after returning (if applicable), and is at least age fifty-five (55);
 - (b) Twenty-five (25) or more years of incentive service credit as a volunteer firefighter with at least five consecutive years as a participant after returning (if applicable) and has attained fifty (50) years of age; or
 - (c) A Participant having attained thirty (30) years of incentive service credit as a volunteer firefighter regardless of age, with at least five consecutive years as a participant after returning (if applicable).
- (3) Eligible Former Participants with ten (10) or more years of service as a volunteer firefighter, but who separated from volunteer service prior to meeting the foregoing age requirements, are eligible to commence receipt of incentive benefit payments from the Plan upon attainment of age sixty (60).
- (4) Incentive benefits shall be made in monthly installments on the last day of each month during the life of the Eligible Former Participant.
- (5) Effective July 1, 2020, the amended annual incentive benefit shall be equal to \$819, multiplied by the eligible years of service. This annual benefit amount shall be positively adjusted for each subsequent fiscal year by the percentage change in the Consumer Price Index (for the Metropolitan Detroit/Ann Arbor area), as published by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Standards, or its successor index ("CPI"), as of June 30 of the preceding fiscal year. However, in no event shall any annual adjustment exceed a maximum increase of 5%, and there shall be no negative adjustment. The amount may also be amended from time to time by a City Council budget appropriations resolution. In the event a Deferred

Former Participant separates from service as an active volunteer firefighter prior to attaining immediate eligibility for incentive benefit payments under this Plan, he or she shall be entitled to an annual incentive benefit calculated in accordance with the provisions of this Plan in effect at the time of said Deferred Former Participant's separation from service as an active volunteer firefighter.

- (6) In the event a Participant has one or more breaks in service, incentive benefits payable under this Plan shall be calculated in accordance with the provisions of the Plan in effect at the time of each separation of service as an active volunteer firefighter.
- (7) Prior to the date of the first incentive benefit payment, but not thereafter, a Participant or an Eligible Former Participant may elect to receive his incentive benefits payable throughout his life, or receive his incentive benefits in a reduced amount payable throughout his life, and nominate a beneficiary, in accordance with one of the Options as set forth below:
 - Option A: 100% Joint and Survivor: Upon the death of an Eligible Former Participant, who elected Option A, his reduced incentive payment shall be continued throughout the life of and paid to such person having an insurable interest in his life, as he shall have nominated; or
 - Option B: 50% Joint and Survivor: Upon the death of an Eligible Former Participant, who elected Option B, one-half of his reduced incentive benefits shall be continued throughout the life of and paid to such person, having an insurable interest in his life, as he shall have nominated.
 - Option C: 100 % Joint and Survivor Pension w/ Pop-up (Pop-up Option A): Upon the death of an Eligible Former Participant who elected Option C, his reduced incentive benefits shall be continued through the life and paid to such person having an insurable interest in his life, as he shall have nominated. If the selected beneficiary predeceases the Eligible Former Participant, the incentive benefits shall revert to a straight-life payment payable throughout the remainder of the Eligible Former Participant's life.
 - Option D: 50% Modified Joint and Survivor Pension with Pop-up (Pop-up Option B): Upon the death of an Eligible Former Participant who elected Option D, one-half of his reduced incentive benefits shall be continued throughout the life of and paid to such person having an insurable interest in his life, as he shall have nominated. If the selected beneficiary predeceases the Eligible Former Participant, the incentive benefits shall revert to a straight-life payment payable throughout the remainder of the Eligible Former Participant's life.
- (8) In the event a Participant dies who has ten or more years of incentive service, his Spouse shall receive an incentive benefit computed in the same manner in all respects as if the Participant had terminated Participation on the day preceding his death, elected Option A, and nominated his Spouse as beneficiary. In the event a Deferred Former Participant dies who has ten or more years of incentive service, his Spouse shall immediately receive an incentive benefit computed in the same manner in all respects as if the Deferred Former Participant was a Participant who terminated Participation on the day preceding his death,

elected Option A, and nominated his Spouse as beneficiary. The beneficiary is not required to meet any additional eligibility requirements, such as reaching age 60. In the event there is no surviving Spouse and the Participant or Deferred Former Participant is survived by one or more legally recognized children, a lump sum equal to 60% of the actuarial present value of the accrued annual incentive benefit shall be payable to the Participant's or Deferred Former Participant's designated legal representative. If there is no surviving spouse or children or designated legal representative, then this lump sum amount shall be paid to his/her estate.

1:203. Miscellaneous.

(1) Each Participant and Eligible Former Participant shall be deemed to have assented to the terms and conditions of the Plan. An individual may not sell, assign or hypothecate, in any manner, all or any part of the individual's potential payments under the Plan.

History

• On July 22, 2019 City Council approved the purchase of two (2) Dodge Charger Police Vehicles; (Resolution #2019-07-083-J-4a).

- Dodge has been experiencing production issues and will not be able to fill the order this fiscal year, therefore the vehicle order has been cancelled and purchase orders have been closed.
- The two (2) vehicles being purchased are replacement vehicles for the Police Department.
- The two (2) obsolete vehicles will be removed from service and sold at auction with estimated proceeds of \$9,000.00.
- This purchase replaces existing vehicles and does not increase the size of the existing Department of Public Works motor pool fleet.

Purchasing

- The current automotive market offers very limited choices that meet the requirements of the City's Police Department.
- As mentioned above Chrysler is experiencing production issues for the Dodge Chargers.
- The current Ford Explorer; has limited room in the vehicle which would consequently force PD staff to prioritize what equipment could be stored in the CPV (Command Patrol Vehicle).
- Equipment needs to be easily accessible for distribution to officers during critical incidents.
- Some of this equipment is bulky and rigid, making storage a challenge in a tight space.
 - This limited space dictates the placement of gear by fit and not by priority.
 - Some equipment is subject to damage due to limited storage space.
 - The storage of that equipment should not compromise driver visibility.
- In the event the equipment needs to be delivered to an area without improved roadways (along the side of a building for example), four wheel drive and higher clearance is preferred.
- A larger vehicle with more storage space would allow the PD to have all the necessary gear on hand and easily accessible when needed.
- Larger vehicles afford more room when the CPV is utilized as a command post during an active critical incident.
- So therefore the Chevrolet Tahoe model is being recommended.

- Berger Chevrolet of Grand Rapids, Michigan is the low total bidder in the Oakland County Cooperative Bid.
 The Oakland County Contract ID #005218 pricing is valid thru September 30, 2020 on selected Chevrolet Tahoe vehicles.
- On February 10, 2014 City Council authorized departments to utilize sites such as GovDeals.com to dispose of city owned surplus items (Resolution# 2014-02-017-J-4a). Therefore note that the city will utilize and market the two (2) obsolete vehicles on GovDeals.com site for optimal trade-in value.



Subject: Open Space Preservation Easement for Chadbury Place

City Council approved a 16 unit cluster development proposed by Mondrian Properties, LLC at its May 20, 2019 Regular Meeting. As part of the approval process, the project, located south of Long Lake, between John R and Dequindre is zoned R-1B, one family residential. Under the City's Zoning Ordinance, a developer who chooses to use the Cluster Option must set aside dedicated open space through an irrevocable conveyance. (Troy Zoning Ordinance 10.04.D.7). As the development project nears completion, approval of the attached document must be accomplished so that it can be recorded with the Oakland County Register of Deeds and Certificates of Occupancy may be issued to new homeowners.

The City's Zoning Ordinance provides that the irrevocable conveyance must be perpetually maintained by the parties that have an ownership interest in the open space. It further provides that if the owners fail to maintain it such that it becomes a public nuisance, then the City may undertake maintenance and annually assess costs. Finally, the open space must forever remain open space as approved on the Final Site Plan, however, accessory structures are permitted as long as they do not exceed one percent (1%) of the open space area. The Zoning Ordinance also specifically requires that the conveyance shall prohibit dumping or storing of material or refuse, activity that causes soil erosion, cutting live plant material except for dying or diseased vegetation, and the use of motorized vehicles.

Recommendation

The City Attorney's office has reviewed the attached Open Space Preservation Easement and recommends approval of the Open Space Preservation Easement for Chadbury Place Site Condominiums.

RECITALS

- A. Declarant owns a certain parcel of land situated in the City of Troy, Oakland County, Michigan, more particularly described in Exhibit A, attached hereto and made a part hereof (the "Property"). Declarant is developing a single family residential site condominium project known as Chadbury Place using the One-Family Cluster Option pursuant to Troy's Zoning Ordinance, Chapter 39, Section 10.04 which requires that certain portions of the Property be permanently preserved and protected as open space areas. Declarant desires to declare such an easement in order to preserve the required open space areas.
- B. The designated open space areas (hereinafter the "Easement Areas") situated on the Property are more particularly described on Exhibit B, attached hereto and made a part hereof, the second page of which contains a drawing depicting the Easement Areas.
- C. The designated Easement Areas fulfill the open space benefit consistent with Chapter 39, Section 10.04(D)(4)(a) of the City's Zoning Ordinance for the following reason:
 - a. Significant Natural Features. Preservation of significant natural features contained on the site, including preserving the existing trees by providing a buffer along Long Lake Road, and the adjoining developments to the south and the west of the

property. Also, the common area will be enhanced with landscaping and berms to create natural features buffer.

THEREFORE, Declarant hereby reserves, conveys and declares the following perpetual Open Space Preservation Easement, which shall be binding upon the Declarant, and its respective heirs, successors, assigns and/or transferees and shall be for the benefit of the City, and purchasers of the Property and their respective heirs, successors, assigns and/or transferees.

- 1. The purpose of this Open Space Preservation Easement is to establish and preserve a perpetual, non-exclusive easement over, under, and on the Easement Areas as identified and depicted in the site plan approved by the City of Troy and as areas that qualify as "open space" in accordance with Chapter 39, Section 10.04(D) of the One-Family Cluster Option. The designated Easement Areas shall be perpetually preserved as open space, and uses of the open space are limited to parks, playgrounds, fields, walking trails, nature areas and other approved uses as permitted in accordance with the One-Family Cluster Option.
- 2. The following uses and activities are expressly prohibited in the Easement Areas;
 - a. dumping or storing any material or refuse,
- b. any activity that may cause risk of soil erosion or threaten any living plant material,
- c. cutting or removing live plant material except for the removal of dying or diseased vegetation,
 - d. using motorized off-road vehicles,
- 3. The dedicated open space shall be perpetually maintained by any party or parties that have an ownership interest in the open space. Initially, the responsible party shall be Declarant who shall be responsible for maintenance of the open space until the Declarant assigns such responsibilities to an association of co-owners (the "Condominium Association" or the "Association) at which time the Association shall be

responsible for maintenance of the open space. The Easement Areas shall be maintained and repaired in the condition required by the final approved site plan, including but not limited to maintenance of landscaped areas and amenities, if any, therein. Once the master deed for the condominium project is recorded and the Association of co-owners is incorporated to own and operate the condominium project including the dedicated Easement Areas, it shall also be the association's responsibility to maintain and repair the Easement Areas.

- 4. This Open Space Preservation Easement does not grant or convey to any member of the general public any right of ownership, possession or use of the Easement Area, except that, upon reasonable written notice to Declarant or successors, the City of Troy and its authorized employees and agents may enter upon and inspect the Easement Areas to determine whether the Easement Areas is being maintained in compliance with the terms of this Open Space Preservation Easement.
- 5. The Easement Areas consist mainly of lawn areas. The Easement Areas shall be carefully inspected on a weekly basis initially by the Declarant, and then by the successors in interest. The Declarant shall immediately remove any garbage and debris that is found in the Easement Areas, and after a transfer of property to an Association, this task shall be performed by the Declarant's successor. A professional landscaping company shall be hired to mow the lawn areas, and the lawn shall be maintained in accordance with all City Ordinances and shall be cut at a minimum on a weekly basis (or more often if necessary) during the appropriate seasons when the lawn will be growing.
- 6. In the event that the Declarant or the successor Association shall at any time fail to carry out the responsibilities specified within this Open Space Preservation Easement and/or fail to preserve and/or maintain the open space areas in reasonable order and condition such that it becomes a public nuisance, the City may serve written notice upon the responsible party, either the Declarant or the Association setting forth the deficiencies in maintenance and/or preservation. Notice shall also set forth a demand that the deficiencies be cured within a stated reasonable time period. If the identified deficiencies are not timely cured administratively, the City may issue citations for violation of any City Code. If the deficiency concerns any provision of this Open

Space Preservation Easement then, after a reasonable time allowed for curing any deficiencies, a hearing may be held before the City Council, or such other Council, body or official delegated by the City Council, for the purpose of allowing the responsible Declarant or Association to be heard as City should proceed with the maintenance and/or to why the not preservation which has not been undertaken. At the hearing, the time for curing the deficiencies and the hearing itself may be extended and/or continued to a date certain. If, following the hearing, the City Council or other body or official designated to conduct the hearing determines that maintenance and/or preservation have not been undertaken within the time specified in the notice, the City shall have the power and authority but not the obligation to enter upon the Property, or cause its agents or contractors to enter upon the Property and perform such maintenance and/or preservation as reasonably found by the City to be appropriate. The cost and expense of making and financing such maintenance and/or preservation including the cost of notices by the City and reasonable legal fees incurred by the City, plus an administrative fee in the amount of 25% of the total of all costs and expenses incurred, shall be paid by the responsible Declarant or Association, and such amount shall constitute a lien on an equal pro rata basis as to all of the units of the condominium within which the Easement Areas are located. In the event one or more of the affected Easement Areas are not located within a condominium, the lien shall be against the portion of the Property in which the Easement Area is located. The City may require the payment of such monies prior to the commencement of work. Declarant or Association has not paid the billed costs and expenses within 30 days all unpaid amounts may be placed on the delinquent tax roll of the City, pro rata, as to each unit, and shall accrue interest and penalties, and shall be collected as, and shall be deemed delinquent real property taxes, according to the laws made and provided for the collection of delinquent real property taxes. In the discretion of the City, such costs and expenses may be collected by suit initiated against the responsible Declarant/Association, and, in such event, the responsible Declarant/Association shall pay all court costs and reasonable attorney fees incurred by the City in connection with such suit.

7. Except as provided below, this Declaration may not be amended or otherwise modified without prior approval of Troy City Council. This Declaration is an integral component of the City's approval of the site plan

and development of the Condominium Project. Accordingly, the City shall be deemed a third party beneficiary of this Declaration and the City (or other governmental entity succeeding to the authority of the City (e.g. if the City is annexed into or becomes part of a city)) shall have the right to enforce the covenants and restrictions set forth in this Declaration. For purposes of the foregoing, the developer of the Condominium Project (Declarant) shall be deemed to be the owner of the Condominium Project during the period such developer owns any portion of the Condominium Project (including units therein) and thereafter the Condominium Association shall be deemed to be the owner of the Condominium Project for purposes of this subparagraph, upon demonstration of the transfer of property. An amendment to this Declaration shall be effective upon the recordation of such amendment with the Oakland County, Michigan Register of Deeds.

- 8. This Open Space Preservation Easement has been made and given for a consideration of a value less than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, and, accordingly, is (i) exempt from the State Transfer Tax, pursuant to MCL 207.526(6)(a); MSA 7.456(26)(2) and (ii) exempt from the County Transfer Tax, pursuant to MCL 207.505(a); MSA 7.456(5)(a).
- 9. This Open Space Preservation Easement shall be recorded with the Oakland County Register of Deeds. Mondrian Properties, LLC shall be responsible for recordation of this Easement including all costs and applicable fees.





As the development project nears completion, approval of the attached document must be accomplished so that it can be recorded with the Oakland County Register of Deeds and Certificates of Occupancy may be issued to new homeowners.

The City's Zoning Ordinance provides that the irrevocable conveyance must be perpetually maintained by the parties that have an ownership interest in the open space. It further provides that if the owners fail to maintain it such that it becomes a public nuisance, then the City may undertake maintenance and annually assess costs. Finally, the open space must forever remain open space as approved on the Final Site Plan, however, accessory structures are permitted as long as they do not exceed one percent (1%) of the open space area. The Zoning Ordinance also specifically requires that the conveyance shall prohibit dumping or storing of material or refuse, activity that causes soil erosion, cutting live plant material except for dying or diseased vegetation, and the use of motorized vehicles. Mondrian Properties has also entered into an Agreement for Conservation Easement with the State of Michigan, Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy ("EGLE") for the same easement areas. before the City Council, or such other Council, body or official delegated by the City Council, for the purpose of allowing the responsible Declarant or Association to be heard as to why the City should not proceed with the maintenance and/or preservation which has not been undertaken. hearing, the time for curing the deficiencies and the hearing itself may be extended and/or continued to a date certain. If, following the hearing, the City Council, or other body or official, designated to conduct the hearing determines that maintenance and/or preservation has not been undertaken within the time specified in the notice, the City shall have the power and authority but not the obligation to enter upon the Property, or cause its agents or contractors to enter upon the Property and perform such maintenance and/or preservation as reasonably found by the City to be appropriate. The cost and expense of making and financing such maintenance and/or preservation, including the cost of notices by the City and reasonable legal fees incurred by the City, plus an administrative fee in the amount of 25% of the total of all costs and expenses incurred, shall be paid by the responsible Declarant or Association, and such amount shall constitute a lien on an equal pro rata basis as to all of the units of the condominium. In the event one or more of the affected Easement Areas are not located within a condominium, the lien shall be against the portion of the Property in which the Easement Area is located. The City may require the payment of such monies prior to the commencement of work. If Declarant or Association has not paid the billed costs and expenses within 30 days, all unpaid amounts may be placed on the delinquent tax roll of the City, pro rata, as to each unit, and shall accrue interest and penalties, and shall be collected as, and shall be deemed delinquent real property taxes, according to the laws made and provided for the collection of delinquent real property taxes. In the discretion of the City, such costs and expenses may be collected by suit initiated against the responsible Declarant/Association, and, in such event, the responsible Declarant/Association shall pay all court costs and reasonable attorney fees incurred by the City in connection with such suit.

7. Except as provided below, this Declaration may not be amended or otherwise modified without prior approval of Troy City Council. This Declaration is an integral component of the City's approval of the site plan and development of the Condominium Project. Accordingly, the City shall be deemed a third party beneficiary of this Declaration and the City (or other governmental entity succeeding to the authority of the City (e.g. if the City is

annexed into or becomes part of a city)) shall have the right to enforce the covenants and restrictions set forth in this Declaration. For purposes of the foregoing, the developer of the Condominium Project shall be deemed to be the owner of the Condominium Project during the period such developer owns any portion of the Condominium Project (including units therein) and thereafter the Condominium Association shall be deemed to be the owner of the Condominium Project for purposes of this subparagraph. An amendment to this Declaration shall be effective upon the recordation of such amendment with the Oakland County, Michigan Register of Deeds.

- 8. This Open Space Preservation Easement has been made and given for a consideration of a value less than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, and, accordingly, is (i) exempt from the State Transfer Tax, pursuant to MCL 207.526(6)(a); MSA 7.456(26)(2) and (ii) exempt from the County Transfer Tax, pursuant to MCL 207.505(a); MSA 7.456(5)(a).
- 9. This Open Space Preservation Easement shall be recorded with the Oakland County Register of Deeds. Mondrian Properties, LLC shall be responsible for recordation of this Easement including all costs and applicable fees.
- 10. This Open Space Preservation Easement is for the same property that is bound by an Agreement for Conservation Easement between Mondrian Properties and the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE). If a conflict arises between the two agreements, then the terms of the more restrictive agreement shall prevail.



AGREEMENT FOR CONSERVATION EASEMENT

	ACCORDINGLY, Grantor hereby conveys unto the Grantee, forever and in perpetuity, this Conservation Easement as set forth in this Agreement pursuant to Subpart 11 of Part 21, Conservation and Historic Preservation Easement, of the NREPA, MCL 324.2140 et seq., on the terms and conditions stated below.

COVENANTS, TERMS, CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS

The purpose of this Agreement is to protect the functions and values of existing or established wetlands
and its natural resource values on the Easement Premises, consistent with the Permit, and the protection
of the benefits to the public derived from wetlands and integral habitat, by requiring Grantor to maintain the

Easement Premises in its natural and undeveloped condition.

- 2. Except as authorized under EGLE Permit Number WRP 017 170 -P, issued on 08 / 15 /20 19 or as otherwise provided in this Agreement, Grantor shall refrain from, and prevent any other person from, altering or developing the Easement Premises in any way. This includes, but is not limited to:
 - a) Alteration of the surface topography;

b) Creation of paths, trails, or roads;

- c) The placement of fill material as defined in Part 303 of the NREPA, MCL 324,30301 et seq., as amended:
- d) Dredging, removal or excavation of any soil or minerals;

e) Drainage of surface or groundwater;

f) Construction or placement of any structure;

g) Plowing, tilling, mowing or cultivating the soils or vegetation;

h) Alteration or removal of vegetation, including the planting of non-native species;

i) Ranching, grazing, farming;

 Use of chemical herbicides, pesticides, fungicides, fertilizers, spraying with biocides, larvicides or any other agent or chemical treatments, unless as part of an EGLE-approved Management Plan;

k) Construction of unauthorized utility or petroleum lines;

Storage or disposal of ash, garbage, trash, debris, abandoned equipment or accumulation of machinery, bio-solids or other waste materials, including accumulated vegetative debris, such as grass clippings, leaves, yard waste or other material collected and deposited from areas outside the Easement Premises;

m) Use or storage of automobiles, trucks or off-road vehicles including, but not limited to, snowmobiles,

dune buggies, all-terrain vehicles, and motorcycles;

n) Placement of billboards or signs, except as otherwise allowed in the Permit or this Agreement;

- Use of the wetland for the dumping of untreated storm water or the directing of treated storm water to the easement premises at a volume that adversely impacts the hydrology of the wetland;
- p) Actions or uses detrimental or adverse to water conservation and purity, and fish, wildlife or habitat preservation.
- 3. Cutting down, burning, destroying, or otherwise altering or removing trees, tree limbs, shrubs or other vegetation, whether living or dead, is prohibited within the Easement Premises, except with the written permission of Grantee, expressly for the removal of trees or limbs to eliminate danger to health and safety, to reduce a threat of infestation posed by diseased vegetation, invasive non-native plant species that endanger the health of native species or as otherwise provided in the EGLE-approved Management Plan for the Easement Premises.
- 4. Grantor is not required to restore the Easement Premises due to alterations resulting from causes beyond the owner's control, including, but not limited to, unauthorized actions by third parties that were not reasonably foreseeable; natural causes or natural disasters, such as unintentional fires, floods, storms, or natural earth movement.
- 5. Grantor, Permittee or its authorized agents or representatives may enter the Easement Premises to perform activities within the Easement Premises consistent with the Permit or the mitigation requirements. Grantor or Permittee shall provide 5 days notice to the Grantee of undertaking any mitigation activity, even if the mitigation project has been conceptually approved. Any activities undertaken pursuant to the Permit, a mitigation project or this Agreement, shall be performed in a manner to minimize the adverse impacts to existing wetland or mitigation areas.
- 6. Grantor covenants that Grantor has good and sufficient title to the Easement Premises described in Exhibit B.
- 7. Grantor covenants that any other existing interests or encumbrances in the Easement Premises have been disclosed to the EGLE.
- 8. Grantor covenants that to the best of Grantor's knowledge no hazardous substances or hazardous or toxic wastes have been generated, treated, stored, used, disposed of or deposited in or on the property.

- This Agreement does not grant or convey to Grantee or members of the general public any right to possession or use of the Easement Premises.
- Grantor shall continue to be responsible for the upkeep and maintenance of the Easement Premises to the
 extent it may be required by law.
- 11. Grantee and its authorized employees and agents, as shown in Exhibit D, may enter the Easement Premises at reasonable times to determine whether the Easement Premises are being maintained in compliance with the terms of this Agreement, mitigation, or other conditions of the Permit; and for purposes of taking corrective actions for failure to comply. If Grantee is entering the Easement Premises for purpose of taking corrective actions, Grantor shall be provided with 14 days notice to provide the opportunity to cure the failure to comply.
- 12. This Agreement shall be binding upon the successors and assigns of the parties and shall run with the land in perpetuity, unless modified or terminated by written agreement of the parties.
- 13. This Agreement may be modified only in writing through amendment of the Agreement. Any modification shall be consistent with the purpose and intent of the Agreement.
- 14. In addition to the right of the parties to enforce this Agreement, it is also enforceable by others against the owner of the land, in accordance with Part 21, Subpart 11 of the NREPA, MCL 324.2140 et seq, as amended.
- 15. Grantor shall indicate the existence of this Agreement on all future deeds, mortgages, land contracts, plats, and any other legal instrument used to convey an interest in the Easement Premises.
- 16. A delay in enforcement shall not be construed as a waiver of the Grantee's rights to enforce the conditions of this Agreement.
- 17. This Agreement shall be liberally construed in favor of maintaining the purpose of the Conservation Easement.
- 18. If any portion of this Agreement is determined to be invalid by a court of law, the remaining provisions will remain in force.
- This Agreement will be construed in accordance with Michigan law. All legal action related to this
 conservation easement must be filed and pursued in Michigan state courts.
- 20. In addition to the terms of the Permit issued by Grantee, this document sets forth the entire agreement of the parties. It is intended to supersede all prior discussions or understandings.
- 21. Within 90 days after this Agreement is executed, Grantor shall place and maintain, at Grantor's expense, signs, fences, or other suitable markings along the Easement Premises to clearly demarcate the boundary of the Easement Premises, or as otherwise provided in the Permit.
- 22. The terms 'Grantor' and 'Grantee' wherever used in this Agreement, and any pronouns used in place thereof, shall include, respectively, the above-named Grantor and their personal representatives, heirs, successors, and assigns, and the above-named Grantee and their successors and assigns.



Subject: PA 152 - Publicly Funded Health Care

History

Public Act 152 of 2011 established limits on the amount that public employers pay toward employee medical benefit plans. Coinciding with each medical insurance plan year (beginning April 1), we must address the alternatives and affirm the City's direction in this matter with a City Council resolution. The alternatives are:

 Hard Cap - The hard cap limits the amount a public employer can contribute to employee health insurance costs; the employer cannot pay more of the annual costs for health insurance than a total amount equal to:

\$ 6,818.87 – times the number of employees with one-person coverage \$14,260.37 – times the number of employees with two-person coverage \$18,596.96 – times the number of employees with family coverage

- 80/20 The 80/20 option states the employer may not pay more than 80% of the total annual costs of all the medical benefit plans it offers or contributes to for its employees.
- Opt-Out The opt-out allows the local unit of government to exercise its discretion to determine what premium share contribution is desired for their organization.

Since the inception of PA 152, the Troy City Council has voted to opt-out each year.

Financial

The financial impact of each option is estimated below:

Estimated Cost Allocation by Option (FY 2020/21 Rates)

PA 152 Option	Employee Share	City Share	Total

Hard Cap	670,652	4,548,933	5,219,585
80/20	1,043,917	4,175,668	5,219,585

Note that our current medical plan is self-funded; accordingly, actual costs (experience) will differ from illustrative rates used in the above schedule.

While overall cost is one consideration, the impact on each individual is another. This year, the effect of PA 152 options on an individual City employee cost share would be as follows:

It should be noted that any option change would only affect non-union, full-time employees (currently 119 employees) until each union collective bargaining agreement expires and contribution rates can be changed for those groups.

Recommendation

We recommend that City Council continues to affirm the City's direction in this matter by selecting the PA 152 opt-out alternative for plan year 2020/21.

4. Request for Traffic Control – North Lake Drive at Sherwood Drive

Kevin Ferguson of 1850 Woodgate Drive states that the lack of traffic control at the intersection

of North Lake Drive and Sherwood Drive creates a hazardous condition now that Raintree Village on the Park has been developed.

Chad Halcom of 1759 North Lake Drive stated that he lives in the last house before the private road starts. His request was to place a speed bump or require the developer to place a speed bump on the private portion of North Lake Drive. His concern is about excessive speeds from the private road to the public road and out to John R. He did not feel that a Stop or Yield sign would be effective. His recommendation was to do something that can't be ignored. During the AM and PM peak hour, traffic control signs may create congestion and backups.

A discussion of speed bumps vs speed humps and private road vs public roads ensued.

Sgt. Novak added that Troy Police provide additional enforcement when new traffic control devices are installed. Portable radar trailers are currently not in use due to the weather. Troy Police have provided direct enforcement in this area within the past six months and found low volumes of traffic and low violation rates for speeding. However, he will schedule this area for a portable radar trailer in the spring as the weather allows.

Hyung Choi of 1754 North Lake reports that traffic drives very fast. UPS and other delivery trucks drive at high rates of speed. Residents are also driving too fast.

Kevin Ferguson of 1850 Woodgate reports that the bus stop for the area is just south of the intersection. The bus stops on northbound Sherwood just south of North Lake. North Lake is approximately ½ mile long and some drivers are driving too fast. This intersection was previously a curve for 40 years and only recently became a 3-way intersection with the development of the new subdivision to the west of the intersection. He supports Stop signs as drivers don't understand Yield signs. He suggests that eastbound North Lake should have a Stop sign. His preference is a Stop sign at minimum and suggests that All-Way Stop control would be the most effective.

Barb McKee of 1783 North Lake stated that a Yield sign would not work. She would like to see at least two Stop signs. The other issue in this area is parents that park on the road to drop off or pick up their kids from the bus. There used to only be a handful of school age children, but with the new subdivision there are over 20 people waiting for the bus on a daily basis. She also stated that delivery vehicles drive very fast in the subdivision. There is a lot of congestion during the times that the school bus is picking up or dropping off children.

Martin Bender of 1819 North Lake discussed the bus stop and its location relative to the intersection and the concerns about the number of parents who park with their children waiting for the bus.

The school bus picks up students around 8:50 AM and drops off around 4:30 PM.

There was discussion about the bus route through the subdivision and potential for relocating the bus stop further to the south away from the intersection and down by the park. Residents discussed calling the Troy School District to report their concerns and suggest that the bus stop be moved to the south.

Mr. Feguson stated that he has spoken with the bus driver and she said she has reported parking issues 3 or 4 times to the school district.

Sgt. Novak stated that Troy Police has a list of known bus stop locations with concerns and North Lake at Sherwood has not been on the list. Troy Police will have an officer in the area during pickup and/or drop off to review the situation.

Mr. Petrulis redirected the discussion back to the request for traffic control. He supports an All-Way Stop as it would help address the flow of traffic and assign right-of-way at the intersection.

Mr. Ziegenfelder stated that he prefers Stop signs to remove any ambiguity.

Mr. Johnson discussed that a sign on Sherwood would not address traffic flow issues. He also supports All-Way Stop control. He discussed that residents should contact the Troy School District to report their concerns and suggestions regarding the bus stop location as Troy School District has been very good to work with in the past.

Ms. Nurak stated that drivers on Sherwood are not used to the new traffic pattern with new traffic from the private road on North Lake. She discussed the bus stop location, parking and the safety of the children waiting for the bus. This may be a growing pain issue with the new subdivision that may require some additional enforcement to educate drivers.

A discussion amongst all ensued regarding the bus stop location, general flow of traffic and parking in the area.

CONDITIONAL REZONING

PUBLIC HEARING – CONDITIONAL REZONING REQUEST (File Number CR 2019-001 – Proposed MNK TROY 1, LLC, East of Rochester, South of Shallowdale (88-20-14-152-001 and 88-20-14-301-031), Section 14, From R-1C (One Family Residential), RT (One Family Attached Residential) and EP (Environmental Protection) Districts to RT (One Family Attached Residential) District

Mr. Carlisle stated the proposed Conditional Rezoning previously considered by the Planning Commission at its October 22, 2019 meeting is revised to seek approval to rezone all portions of the two parcels to RT (One Family Attached Residential). He referenced the voluntary conditions offered by the applicant and specifically addressed the Open Space Preservation Area proposed for the EP-zoned portion. Mr. Carlisle said if the rezoning application is granted approval, additional details of the Open Space Preservation Area would need to be provided.

Mr. Carlisle briefly reviewed the initial application and comments both from the Planning Commission and the public.

Mr. Carlisle addressed the split zoning of the northern parcel and front portion of the southern parcel. He said the proposed rezoning to RT is consistent with the Master Plan, noting the site has been master planned for medium density and multiple family residential for the past 20 years. Mr. Carlisle indicated the applicant is providing increased setbacks along the northern and eastern property lines to provide additional buffer.

Mr. Carlisle addressed the eastern portion of the southern parcel that is zoned EP. He explained the applicant is seeking to use the parcel for overall density and stormwater management. He said the proposed detention pond is utilitarian in design and the double row of trees to screen is insufficient. Mr. Carlisle said that both the detention area and tree screening would not serve as an amenity to future residents of the development or adjacent residents. Mr. Carlisle said a naturalized pond area such as a bio-swale or raingarden would enhance the development.

Mr. Carlisle recommended that the Planning Commission consider the revised application, take into consideration public comments this evening and provide direction to the applicant.

John Thompson of Professional Engineering Associates distributed a handout incorporating changes in the voluntary conditions offered by the applicant. He referenced condition #3 relating to the detention basin design as a dry pond and the addition of condition #8 relating to rear yard relationship and setbacks to existing houses and condition #9 enhancement to the screening of the Open Space Easement.

Mr. Thompson stated the revisions to the application and to the conditions offered by the applicant are a result of the feedback received from the neighbors and the Planning Commission. Mr. Thompson said a major concern of the neighbors is vehicular headlights shining toward adjacent single family homes. He said the additional row of screening trees and the orientation of the buildings would address that concern. Also, Mr. Thompson said the neighbors want a dry pond. The neighbors hope a dry pond improves the existing geese problem they are having as well eliminate insects drawn to standing water. He said a utilitarian design of the dry pond is preferred both by the neighbors and City departments for easier maintenance. Mr. Thompson addressed the proposed development as relates to the Rezoning Standards.

PUBLIC HEARING OPENED

- Naresh Gupta, 4337 Bennett Park Circle; addressed overall development along Rochester Road corridor from I-75 to the southern border of Troy as relates to the Master Plan and density, addressed concerns with traffic impact from development.
- Jim McCauley, 4435 Harold; representative of Shallowbrook Homeowners' Association. Mr. McCauley said the neighbors met with the builders since the application was considered in October and they are in support of the proposed development at this point in time. He referenced condition #8 offered by the applicant. Mr. McCauley said the intent with the rear yard relationship and a minimum of 35 feet building setbacks to existing houses on Shallowdale is to serve as a buffer, similar to the buffer of the existing EP-zoned parcel. He said the setbacks and additional screening will alleviate the concern of vehicular lights shining into the homes. Mr. McCauley said the neighbors want a dry detention basin to distract geese from their homes. Mr. McCauley asked that the applicant explore further turning either Building 3 or Building 4 to a rear yard setback to the dry detention pond; he was told it's not feasible but he is asking the applicant to research that matter further.
- Jon Hughes, 4495 Harold; expressed disappointment that they are losing the natural environment with the proposed development.

Mr. Savidant clarified for the record that Mr. McCauley was granted additional time to speak because he is spoke on behalf of the homeowners' association.

 - Location, depth, slope, shape, size.

Ms. Dufrane addressed the voluntary conditions offered by the applicant in relation to a conceptual plan and not an actual site plan. Ms. Dufrane said it would be best to meet with the applicant, the homeowners' association representative, Planning Consultant and administration to craft and/or wordsmith the conditions associated with the Conditional Rezoning request prior to consideration by City Council.

Mr. Savidant informed the audience the role of the Planning Commission is to make a recommendation to City Council. The public would have an opportunity to speak at the time City Council considers the item, and again during Site Plan consideration if the Conditional Rezoning is granted.

The applicant was advised to update the concept plan to show the rotation of buildings and additional screening prior to consideration by City Council.

Subject: Federal Funding for Major Road Work

Rochester Road, North of Long Lake (Trinway) to South Boulevard

At the Oakland County Federal Aid Funding Committee meeting of February 11, 2020, \$419,000 in federal funds were awarded for concrete pavement replacement on Rochester Road, from north of Long Lake (Trinway) to South Boulevard in 2024. The total project cost is estimated at \$524,000. The City share of this amount is 20% or \$105,000.

The intent is to include the concrete pavement replacement work as part of the future Rochester Road, north of Wattles (Barclay) to north of Long Lake (Trinway) reconstruction and widening project anticipated to start construction in the winter of 2023/24. Concrete pavement replacement work would be coordinated with the overall maintenance of traffic plan to address deteriorated pavement while traffic is switched for construction.

A future cost participation agreement will be presented to City Council for approval once the federal funds are available to obligate.

It is anticipated that additional City funds will be budgeted for additional concrete pavement replacement work so that we can address as much of the poor pavement north of the reconstruction project as possible at one time.

The project award of \$524,000, in 2024, brings the total approved amount of funding for major roads in Troy to approximately \$26,200,000. Troy's match to these funds is approximately \$4,700,000 with the remaining \$21,500,000 in federal, state, RCOC or other agency funds. Projects included in this total are:

- 2021 Rochester, Barclay to Trinway Right-of –Way
- 2021 Adams, Long Lake to Square Lake Construction
- 2022 14 Mile, I75 to Dequindre Construction
- 2023 Rochester, Barclay to Trinway Construction
- 2024 Rochester, Trinway to South Boulevard Construction

CITY OF TROY QUARTERLY REPORT SIX MONTHS ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2019 HIGHLIGHTS

General Fund

Revenues

Total revenues are \$46.2 million to date and represent 73.3% of total budgeted revenues and other sources. This is an increase of \$2.1 million or 4.8% compared to the same time period in the prior year and includes recognition of total annual tax revenues of \$34.6 million. Tax revenue increased \$2.0 million or 6.1%.

Expenditures

Total General Fund expenditures to date are \$28.8 million or 43.7% of the annual budget. Majority of departments appear to be within expected budgetary parameters to date. The Nature Center and Historic Village amounts appear higher due to the City annual contributions at the beginning of the year, however total expenditures compared with the prior year are within expectations.

Capital Fund

Revenues

Total revenues are \$11.1 million to date and represent 70.4% of total budgeted revenues and other sources. This is an increase of approximately \$0.9 million from the prior year to date due primarily to the increase contributions from the general fund and library fund.

Expenditures

Expenditures for capital projects of \$6.8 million represent 42.8% of budgeted projects. This is up approximately \$0.4 million due to the roof replacement project and purchase of election equipment offset by a decrease in street improvements.

Debt Service Fund

Revenues

Total revenues of \$3.0 million are up \$88 thousand or 3.0% compared to the prior year as expected.

Expenditures

Total expenditures of \$2.8 million represent 97.0% of annual debt service requirements.

Major Streets Fund

Revenues

Total revenues of \$3.2 million represent 48.7% of total budget revenues. This is a decrease of \$258 thousand or 7.4% from prior year. The decrease is due to \$484 thousand special appropriation from State Legislature last year offset by the normal increase in Act 51 appropriations (Gas and Weight Taxes). Current trends indicate that the fund will generate budgeted amounts by the end of the fiscal year.

Expenditures

Total expenditures of \$3.1 million represent 43.3% of total budgeted expenditures. This is an increase of \$520 thousand over the prior year amount or 20.5% as expected.

Local Streets Fund

Revenues

Total revenues of \$2.0 million represent 49.1% of total budgeted revenues. This is an increase of \$338 thousand or 20.1% due primarily to the increase of \$250 thousand from the Major Street Fund. Current trends indicate that the fund will generate budgeted amounts by the end of the fiscal year.

Expenditures

Total expenditures of \$1.6 million represent 39.6% of total budgeted expenditures. This is an increase of \$159 thousand over the prior year amount or 11.0% as expected.

Aquatic Center

Revenues

Revenues of \$350 thousand represent 58.6% of the fund's annual budgeted financial resources. This is up \$19 thousand or 5.6% compared to the prior year during the same time period. The increase is due primarily to daily passes and seasonal memberships. It should be noted that the majority of the revenue for membership passes comes in the months of May and June. Weather conditions can have a significant impact on financial results.

Expenses

Expenses of \$380 thousand are down \$32 thousand or 7.7% primarily due to less personal service expenses. This is attributable to weather in summer 2019.

Sanctuary Lake Golf Course

Revenues

Revenues of \$1.1 million are up \$82 thousand or 8.1% compared to the prior year for the same time period. Total year to date rounds are 25,433 representing an increase of approximately 2,096 rounds from prior year. Average revenue per round is \$42.85 compared to prior year of \$43.14.

Expenses

Total expenditures of \$1.08 million are up \$40 thousand or 3.9% compared to prior year.

As in prior years, it is not anticipated that income from operations will cover the entire debt service amount budgeted at \$894 thousand. Weather conditions can have a significant impact on financial results.

Sylvan Glen Golf Course

Revenues

Revenues of \$853 thousand are up \$103 thousand or 13.7% compared to the prior year to date amounts. Total year to date rounds are 28,589 representing an increase of approximately 3,850 rounds from the prior year. Average revenue per round is \$24.63 compared to prior year of \$24.77.

Expenses

Total expenditures of \$752 thousand are up \$80 thousand or 11.8% compared to prior year. Weather conditions can have a significant impact on financial results.

Sanitary Sewer Fund

Revenues

Sanitary Sewer fund revenues of \$7.6 million are down \$684 thousand or 8.2% from the prior year to date due primarily from consumption (sold 263,852 mcf, down 26,864 mcf or 9.2%).

Expenses

Sewer fund expenses of \$9.1 million are up \$1.8 million from the prior year to date due to capital purchase increases of almost \$1.7 million.

Water Fund

Revenues

Water fund revenues of \$11.4 million are down \$0.9 million or 7.4% primarily due to a decrease in consumption (sold 263,852 mcf, down 26,864 mcf or 9.2%). Rates increased to \$40.50 per mcf. Weather patterns can have a significant impact on consumption over the summer months.

Expenses

Water fund total expenses of \$12.8 million are up \$1.1 million. The increase is primarily due to capital and maintenance of \$1.5 million offset by a decrease in current year operating costs \$0.4 million.

Subject: City Manager Status Report

Background

On March 18, 2019 the City Council adopted Resolution #2019-03-031: RESOLVED, that Troy City Council hereby ADOPTS the 2019-2020 Strategies for the upcoming fiscal year as presented by City Management. The purpose of this memo is to provide a status report on the 2019-2020 Strategies and other important projects.

2019 - 2020 Strategies

1. Re-evaluate the Trails & Pathways program with a focus on public participation and creative problem-solving to build community support.

Anderson, Eckstein, and Westrick, Inc. (AEW) has submitted the wetland application to the State of Michigan's Environment, Great Lakes and Energy Department (EGLE) for Sylvan Glen Lake Park. Some of the trail crosses through regulated wetlands and our proposal to the state is the least impactful to the area.

The City of Troy was approached by members of the Troy First Methodist Church located at 6363 Livernois (Livernois between South Boulevard and Square Lake) about allowing the church to connect its property to the subdivision to the east with a trail. This would require a partnership since the City of Troy owns the parcel between the church and the subdivision. This also presents an excellent opportunity since the city was having difficulty connecting the natural area to Livernois. After meeting with church members we set a date to walk the property and determine where the trail would best be positioned. The meeting was very energetic and all partners involved are excited to move forward. We will continue to work on this partnership with presenting a few options to the church as the next steps.

2. Gather community input, reassess the most recent Town Center initiative, and develop a plan for the future of the Civic Center property.

No change since the December report. The customer service needs of City Hall are being assessed through Strategy #3 and community input will be gathered through Strategy #10. Both are described below. Planning for the future of the Civic Center property will be discussed with the City Council during the fiscal year 2020-2021 strategic planning process.



3. Determine the customer service needs of City Hall and incorporate the findings of the Facilities Condition Assessment into the maintenance plan of the facilities.

Department heads continued to meet with OHM in February to discuss the different uses of the areas within City Hall and if there are additional space needs for each department. OHM will be presenting its solutions based on the department heads' input to the steering committee in early March. Once the concept is agreed upon, OHM will present coast estimates to the city for future consideration.

4. Establish a comprehensive Capital Improvement Program and planning process that is reviewed and implemented on an annual basis.

No change since the December report. City staff is establishing a capital improvements program consistent with the Michigan Planning Enabling Act, Act 33 of 2008. Special City Council meetings for presentation of the proposed budget are scheduled for Monday, April 20, 2020 and Wednesday, April 22, 2020. The City Council must adopt the fiscal year 2020-2021 budget on or before Monday, May 18, 2020 (City Charter Section 8.3).

5. Convene the Charter Revision Committee to evaluate charter language and millage limitations, and develop a strategy to fund the Library past 2021.

No change since the December report. A report regarding library funding was included in the November 25, 2019 City Council agenda packet. City Council has scheduled a special meeting on Monday, June 8th to weigh its options and prepare ballot wording for the November 3, 2020 general election.

6. Determine public transportation service needs, and implement a revised plan for the Big Beaver Shuttle and Medi-Go.

The City of Troy launched Troy R.Y.D.E. (Reach Your Destination Easily) on October 1, 2019. This service continues to grow with an increasing request for service. Staff will continue to monitor the demand for service to ensure we are meeting current service demands.

7. Update the Parks and Recreation Plan and incorporate the Green Space Subcommittee recommendations to protect and invest in the City's parks.

City Council approved the plan during the January 27th, 2020, City Council Meeting. The plan was forwarded to the State of Michigan and SEMCOG. Staff has requested funding for some of the action plan items and will be vetted through the budgeting process.



8. Evaluate the Volunteer Firefighters Incentive Plan to ensure the policy is reasonable and sustainable.

An action item regarding the VFIP is included in this City Council agenda packet. City Council will be asked to take action at its February 24, 2020 regular meeting.

9. Study the feasibility of a Rochester Road Improvement District.

A report regarding this strategy was included in the November 25, 2019 City Council agenda packet, with City Management recommending no additional action be taken at this time. Please let City Management know if you have any further comments or questions.

10. Develop a plan to effectively engage residents and businesses through community conversations.

City Management has been researching various methods of community engagement, including a revised resident/business survey, City Branding and signage, and the development of a comprehensive Public Participation Plan as a part of this strategy. In addition, the Downtown Development Authority has begun discussions as to how to use its marketing budget to promote the Big Beaver Corridor.

Each of these various topics are still in the development stage, and City Management will provide additional updates in the coming months.

Other Projects

Classification and Compensation Study

Following the presentation by GovHR on December 12, 2019, employees and their supervisors had the opportunity to submit requests for appeal/reevaluation. Appeals were received and the review is in process to determine if changes should be made to prior to finalizing the report.

Forensic Accounting Investigation Corrective Action Plan (CAP)

No change since the December report. A memo dated September 18, 2019 was included in the September 23, 2019 City Council agenda packet (P-02b) and a memo dated September 30, 2019 was included in the October 7, 2019 City Council agenda packet (P-02a). These memos summarized the corrective actions taken related to expenses and City Council agenda memos. Training on the new electronic agenda memo approval process was conducted during the week of November 11, 2019 and the process is being used for the November 25, 2019 City Council agenda packet.

Additional reports will be provided regarding the remaining corrective actions in the coming months.



Citizens Academy

A graduation ceremony was held during the November 25, 2019 City Council meeting. After considering the costs and feedback, City Management plans to hold Citizens Academy on an annual basis on the autumn of each year. Planning for the 2020 Citizens Academy will begin in late Q2 of 2020.

City Council Orientation

The third and final orientation session was held on January 27. It is City Management's hope that the orientation sessions were helpful for both on-boarding new Council Members and expanding the knowledge and understanding of previously seated members. Please let City Management know if you have any additional questions or concerns, or desire additional training.

City Council Personnel Evaluations

City Attorney and City Manager evaluation forms were distributed to City Council on February 10 and are due on February 24. The consultant will compile the results and distributed them on February 28. Special City Council meetings for personnel evaluations are scheduled for Monday, March 2, 2020 and Monday, March 23, 2020. However, it may be possible to conduct both evaluations on March 2 if evaluation forms are completed on time.

City Council & Planning Commission Joint Meeting

City Council held a joint meeting with the Troy Planning Commission on February 4. City Management is working to address the issues discussed at the meeting. Many are likely to become goals for the coming fiscal year.

Strategy Development

City Council held its annual strategy development meeting on February 13. City Management is preparing a list of strategies that reflect the outcomes of that meeting for City Council's consideration in March.

Capital Project Updates

Through the budget process, City Council approves capital projects and then is presented with contracts to fulfill the budgeted projects using a competitive bid process. Some capital projects are subdivided using the Facilities and Ground Staff to manage the project in phases. The individual phases often do not meet the purchasing financial threshold to have City Council resolve on the expenditure. Therefore, we will report on these projects using this format to inform City Council of their progress.



Capital Project 2020C0065 Sewer – Storage Building and Workshop

Total Project cost - \$150,000

The Storage Building and Workshop project renovates 4,000 ft² that was shared between the Fleet Operation Division and the Water/Sewer Operation Division and repurposes it into usable heated storage and workshop space for the Water/Sewer Operation Division. The Facilities and Grounds Division has acted as the general contractor on this project and has performed a significant portion of the work with in-house staff. To date the following work has taken place:

- Unit Heater Replacement
- North Man Door Replacement
- Metal roofing repair
- Electrical plan
- Purchase of compressor and airline piping
- Installation of 3" of open cell spray on foam insulation (Expected to be completed 02/11/2020)
- Replacement of Electrical service panel and branch circuits
- Relocation of Unit Heater
- CMU Block Repairs
- Air Compressor has been installed
- Airline Piping has been installed
- Service panel has been replaced along with all branch circuits.

Forthcoming work to be completed

- Gas Line replacement
- Plumbing and sewer
- Steel Frame Painting
- Exterior metal paneling repairs
- Exterior painting
- Interior storage
- Equipment installation

The Facilities and Grounds Operations Division will continue perform as the general contractor for this project. This project is anticipated to be under budget and will be completed by June 30, 2020.

Capital Project 2020C0079 Motor Pool – Garage/Parts Room Renovation

Total Project cost \$60,000

The Motor Pool – Garage/Parts Room Renovation project was created to renovate the 1,400 ft² new parts storage room, technician library and supervisor work space. The Facilities and Grounds Division will serve as the General Contractor on this project. Facilities will coordinate trades as



needed with the intention to perform a portion of the work with in-house staff. To date the following work has taken place:

Completed to date:

- Painting
- Floor burnishing
- Shelving
- Work stations

Forthcoming work to be completed:

- Access control for vehicle and equipment keys
- Installation of:
 - Windows and doors

The Facilities and Grounds Operations Division will continue acting as the General Contractor for this project. This Project will be completed within the existing budget and will be completed by June 30, 2020.

Subject: Liquor Violation Hearings

On- Premises Liquor Licenses

Michigan law (MCL 436.1501) and Troy's Liquor Ordinance (Chapter 101) allow for City Council to object to the otherwise automatic renewal of a liquor license for On-Premises licenses (sit down restaurants). However, before taking any adverse action against a liquor license, the City must provide due process to allow the licensee to challenge the violation and/or articulate mitigating circumstances. For this reason, in the past, City Administration has scheduled liquor violation hearings prior to the State's March 31 licensing deadline. For this year, the following on-premises liquor licenses had violations, where there were sales to minors, chronologically listed:

Midori Sushi- 1913 E. Big Beaver Road- 3/23/2019- MLCC imposed an \$800 fine- no priors Bailey's- 1965 W. Maple- 11/21/2019- MLCC violation pending- no priors under current owner Kona Grill- 30 E. Big Beaver- 11/21/2019- MLCC violation pending-no priors Courtyard Marriott- 1525 E. Maple- 11/23/2019- MLCC violation pending-last violation 2000 Sy Thai- 459 E. Big Beaver Road- 12/10/2019- MLCC violation pending- no priors

For the past few years, based on similar violation records, the Troy City Council has required licensees to submit proof of additional server training, and has not objected to the automatic renewal. One of the issues raised in past liquor hearings is the punishment for the clerks that sold alcohol to minors. City Administration has confirmed that the sales clerks in each of the instances above were issued a ticket for the unlawful sale to a minor. The maximum punishment for this civil infraction violation under state law is \$100.

Off- Premises Liquor Licenses

Michigan law limits a municipality's ability to take adverse actions against an off-premises liquor license (alcohol sold for consumption off the premises). The Michigan Liquor Control Commission will take no adverse action against an off premises liquor license unless there are three or more violations in a calendar year. None of the Troy violators, as set forth below, satisfy this threshold:

BP Gas Station- 2989 Crooks Road- 3/10/2019- MLCC imposed an \$800 fine- no priors

Two thirds of the off-premises violators for 2019 were gas stations. Effective January 2017, the State of Michigan relaxed its laws restricting gas stations, and the City then received a significant number of applications. Prior to that time, the City had an ordinance that restricted liquor sales at gas stations, but this ordinance is arguably pre-empted by the revised state law, which the City objected to prior to its passage.

All of the off premises sales clerks selling alcohol to a minor were issued a civil infraction ticket, which is the maximum penalty that can be imposed under state law.

Recommendation

City Administration can request each on premises and off premises license produce proof of additional liquor sales training as a result of these violations, without the need for a formal City Council resolution. Most likely, this would be required by the Michigan Liquor Control Commission anyways if the violation is established. Following this, City Administration recommends that City Council forego the due process liquor violation hearings for violations in 2019, as set forth above.

If City Council believes that these public hearings should be scheduled, they should be scheduled in March 2020 to comply with the Michigan Liquor Control Commission's licensing calendar.
