






- More than 90% of current funding comes from the library millage.
- All other revenue sources (penal fines, overdue fines, state aid, etc.) account for less than 10% of current library funding.
- Penal fines and state aid will likely be reduced due to state budget cuts.
- Overdue fines are decreasing because of automatic renewals and the popularity of eBooks (reduces fine accrual; no fines).
- Reliance on this revenue makes the Library vulnerable to future service reductions when costs increase and/or revenues decrease.
- It's the icing, not the cake.




Operations

- The current library millage (0.6805 mills in 2020) will not cover the full cost of operating the Library 55 hours six days a week in fiscal year 2020-2021.
- Fiscal year 2020-2021 budgeted expenditures are \$4.128 million.
- \$4.128 million is equivalent to approximately 0.8000 mill
- Library property taxes (\$3.452 million) are budgeted for 83.6% of expenditures.
- Library Fund Balance (\$393,000) is budgeted for 9.5% of expenditures.
- Other Library Fund revenue (\$283,000) are budgeted for 6.9% of expenditures.

Maintenance

- The current library millage does not cover the full cost of maintaining the Library.
- The City has invested approximately \$2.8 million in building maintenance and upgrades since the library millage began in fiscal year 2011-2012 (about \$300,000 annually on average).
- The Capital Projects Fund, not the Library Fund, funded approximately \$1.2 million for renovations and roof replacement in fiscal year 2019-2020.
- The fiscal year 2020-2021 budget includes only \$48,000 for maintenance and repairs.
- Another \$228,000 of maintenance was deferred due to lack of funds.





NEEDS

Collection

 The Library needs approximately \$600,000 annually (0.12 mill) for materials.

Fund Balance

 Restoring the Library Fund balance will help reduce the Library's vulnerability to future service reductions when costs increase and/or revenues decrease (rainy days).

Building Maintenance

- The current Troy Public Library opened in 1971 and expanded in 1984.
- A facility of this age requires significant annual reinvestment.
- The Library has ongoing capital and noncapital maintenance needs and the library millage must fund those needs to prevent competition with other priorities.

WANTS

Hours

- Service was reduced from seven to six days a week in July 2010.
- The Library was open 65 hours before the Great Recession and 55 hours weekly before the pandemic.
- Comparable libraries were recently open between 58 and 74 hours weekly.
- The average of comparable libraries was 68 hours weekly.

Upgrades

 Additional funding may be considered for updates and new amenities.


Considerations

- The current millage rate is not sustainable and must increase to prevent service reductions.
- The millage rate must provide for the Library's needs.
- The millage rate may provide for the Library's wants.
- City Council may levy less than the maximum millage rate approved by voters.
- The millage rate will be rolled back in the future when property values increase faster than inflation.

Baseline

- Roughly equivalent to fiscal year 2020-2021 expenditures.
- Does not adequately provide for the Library's needs.
- This is not sustainable.

• Provides for the Library's needs.


Option B (1.0000 mill)

Option A (0.9000 mill \$4.6 million) Option B (1.0000 mill \$5.1 million)



- Oakland County voters have approved terms ranging from four years to twenty years.
- Ten years is common.
- Five years is exceptionally short compared to others.
