Subject: Proclamations and Congratulatory Certificates

Background

City Council Rules of Procedure are the guidelines set by City Council for its meetings. Rule 7 is regarding Proclamations and Congratulatory Certificates. City Council held a special meeting on February 28, 2022 to discuss proclamations and provide City staff with direction regarding potential criteria. Four themes emerged: health, safety, welfare, and local impact. The May 23, 2022 City Council agenda included a report regarding proclamations. The purpose of this memo is to provide proposed guidelines for City Council consideration.

Proposed Guidelines

Proclamation requests must be submitted by Troy community members (residents and non-resident business owners, employees, and property owners).

Proclamations may be issued for the following:

- 1. To recognize individuals, events, and organizations in Troy.
- 2. To promote public awareness campaigns related to health, safety, and welfare.
- 3. To promote annual special days, weeks, and months recognized by presidential proclamation.

Proclamations may not be issued for the following:

- Ideology
- Politics
- Religion

Examples

The following examples would satisfy these guidelines if requested by a Troy community member.

- Proclamation in Recognition of Athens High School 2021-2022 Student Council (April 25, 2022)
- Proclamation Celebrating Max and Sophia Pollak For Organizing Holiday Food Drives to Feed the Needy (February 14, 2022)

The following examples would not satisfy these guidelines if requested by a Troy community member.

Politics: National School Choice Week. I use this example because the "Proclamations

Department" of National School Choice Week recently contacted the City to inquire about the process for submitting a proclamation request. Opportunity in education may not seem like a political issue to the casual observer. However, school choice has been a major policy platform for Republicans and Democrats generally oppose policies that support access to private schools. The controversial nature of these policies is evidenced by lawsuits like Espinoza v. Montana Dept. of Revenue (06/30/2020) and 20-1088 Carson

v. Makin (06/21/2022) reaching the Supreme Court.

Religion: Hindu Heritage Month. I use this example because City Council recognized Hindu

Heritage Month as recently as October 25, 2021. The Hindu Heritage Month website is a collaborated initiative of many Hindu organizations worldwide. It includes a collection of proclamations from around the country and provides help to individuals seeking proclamations. No president has issued a proclamation but Governor Gretchen Whitmer did a proclamation on October 22, 2021. Religion may be best celebrated on days like the National Religious Freedom Day (January 16) and/or the National Day of Prayer (first

Thursday of May).

Remembrance: Armenian Remembrance Day. I use this example because City Council recognized

Armenian Remembrance Day as recently as October 25, 2021. Governor Gretchen Whitmer issued a proclamation and President Joe Biden issued a statement regarding Armenian Remembrance Day on April 24, 2022 but no president has issued a proclamation. In recent years, annual days of remembrance recognized by presidential proclamation have been limited to National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day (December 7, 2021), National Days of Prayer and Remembrance of September 11, 2001 (September 10, 2021, through September 12, 2021), Patriot Day and National Day of Service and Remembrance of September 11, 2001 (September 11, 2021), and Days of Remembrance

of Victims of the Holocaust (April 24 through May 1, 2022).
